MINI SANDWICHES:

Use crackers or cut-up-bread or give the kids a few slices of bread, lunch meat and cheese and a couple of miniature cookie cutter to make tiny fun-shaped sandwiches.

ANTS ON A LOG:

Celery sticks filled with either cream cheese, hummus or peanut butter... top with raisins, apple dices, etc

These are great snacks for toddlers! Many toddlers will eat just the "filling" and the raisins which is just fine! Ensure what you add is appropriate for your toddlers

Multicultural Activities

St. Patrick's Magnet

What you need: Scissors, green craft foam, Green stickers, Glue, Magnet, Photo of child

Instructions: cut a heart out of green craft foam, cut a photo to fit within the heart. Stick stickers around the frame, cut a piece of magnet and glue to back.

Mardi Gras Paper Crown

This simple project can be worn by the children after it's been created. Great for a multitude of themes and celebrations. Use different colors appropriate for the theme or the child's preferences.

Materials: thin cardboard (poster board or old cereal boxes work well), foil gift wrap or construction paper, scissors, paint, crayons or felt tip pens, glue, stapler. Optional: stickers, markers, glitter, shapes cut from construction paper

Directions: cut a strip of cardboard long enough to go around your head and overlap slightly. You may need to staple two pieces together to make it long enough. The strip should be 3 or 4 inches wide and long enough to go around the head.


Cut a piece of construction paper or foil gift wrap the same length but slightly wider. Glue construction paper (or foil) to the cardboard. Cut a zigzag in the top edge of the construction paper. Decorate using markers, glitter, stickers, etc.

Make a ring and staple to make a crown!

Toddler Activities by Provider: Candita Lopez

1. Here's a great activity where your children can have some fun making some artwork without making too much of a mess! Take a paper plate and soak it in water for a few seconds. Put the plate on a table covered with newspaper and let your toddler draw on the wet plate with some washable markers. She'll see how the colours run just like watercolours!

Supplies needed: Paper Plates and washable markers

Tips/Suggestions:

- you might need to show your child first how the colours will change by running a marker over the plate
- show your toddler what happens when two colours are used next to each other
- why not set up a plate for yourself to do next to your toddler!!!??



2. What could be better than a contained painting project that will keep your toddler's hands clean! You'll need some gallon ziplock bags, a sponge, a paper, and kids paint.. Then take a moist sponge and cut into smaller pieces.. Press each piece of sponge into different colour paint and then put them all inside the bag and close it. Then put the bag on the table and let your toddlers squish down on the sponges and see how they put the paint on the paper. Let him shake the bag to move the sponges around and squeeze down on them again. Then when he's done take out the paper and let it dry!! No mess!!!

Tips/Suggestions:

- you might want to put some newspaper on the table just in case mess spills out of the bag.
- don't put too much paint on the sponges, but just enough on both sides to let the toddler get some paint on the paper

Supporting and Encouraging Children's Right to be Heard

Children learn and grow through

participating and engaging with others.

Active participation involves expressing their ideas and having their views listened to, respected and valued by adults and peers. All children – no matter what age or stage of development – are able to express themselves, though the ways and means may differ. Babies cry, babble or make gestures to communicate while older children use words, drawing, music and play to express their thoughts and emotions. The responsibility falls on parents and caregivers to create opportunities for children to express themselves, to “hear” what children have to say and show that they take these views seriously

Show children that they are being Heard

Be attentive and available.

Show you are interested and focused by getting down to the child's eye level.

Make the child feel comfortable about expressing herself by providing encouragement.

Be patient and allow the child time to verbalize what she is trying to say.

Ask questions and paraphrase to ensure that you truly understand the child's message.

Realize that the types of questions you ask can encourage or discourage the child's participation in a conversation. Ask openended questions to encourage the child to elaborate.

Be aware that if you model active listening skills with the child, she is more likely to listen actively to others. Listening skills help the child to have meaningful interactions with


